

Mindi Poston Gay of MPG Home Design in Byfield believes interior decor should be affordable, beautiful and functional - which is why when the mother of two young sons gets her family room ready for spring, she keeps it simple.

After 15 years working for well-known architectural firms, Poston Gay opened her design firm out of her home two years ago. She says people are craving interiors that incorporate who they are and what they need from life, without breaking the bank.

"I love good design, and I work to bring it out of people," she says. "I ask people lots of questions and find things out about them to make design personal. If the room is not your vibe or your essence, then it could just be anyone's home."

Poston Gay's family room was converted out of her former office, which is being relocated to a new room over her garage. She hopes the makeover is the start

Almost everything in the family room was purchased locally, with Comina, Red Bird Trading and Lively Kids, all in Newburyport, among Poston Gay's favorite shops.

But the furnishings and accents also include castoffs discovered by Poston Gay. The designer's drives around the area have certainly proven successful, resulting in pieces that include everything from an antique dresser to a mid-century Danish credenza.

"Some of the best pieces I found have been on the side of the road," she says. "I like finding things and dressing them up a bit. I reupholster or paint and put my touch on it.'


Fresh and inviting
